### Part I. Introduction

### A. Executive Summary

The Philippine Center for Economic Development (PCED) was created in 1974 by Presidential Decree 453 to support the University of the Philippines School of Economics (UPSE) in its teaching, research, and training functions. PCED, a government-owned and controlled corporation, was envisioned to provide the needed support to UPSE so that policy relevant research is produced and disseminated, capacity in economic analysis can be developed in government, and a venue for the exchange of ideas can be provided.

The PCED building complex is located in Guerrero St. at UP Diliman, Quezon City and houses UPSE. The complex includes 11 classrooms, 30 faculty rooms, 5 meeting and seminar rooms, 7 school administration offices, a faculty lounge, a computer laboratory, a three-storey library building, and an auditorium.

In 2010, PCED provided a substantial amount of support to UPSE in the form of faculty research grants, publications funds, student fellowships, and provision of facilities for teaching, training, workshops, seminars, and policy forums. PCED's total expenditure in 2010, amounting to P7.655 million, was about one-third of UPSE's total expenditures in academic year 2010/11.

This magnitude of PCED support continues to be crucial in helping the School maintain its leading role in economics education and research.

### B. Brief History and Program Goals

PCED was created on 15 March 1974 by Presidential Decree (PD) No. 453 with the primary responsibility of giving "...financial and moral support to the research, teaching, training, and other programs of the School of Economics University of the Philippines." In addition, PCED was tasked to "formulate a program for financing the academic and other programs of the School, including the endowment of faculty chairs."

In effect, PCED was created to support the following functions of UPSE:

- (a) to conduct and engage in research work and studies oriented towards national policy and the needs of national development in the field of economics, particularly in the areas of:
  - (1) monetary and fiscal policy;
  - (2) tariff and trade policy;
  - (3) industrial and agricultural policy;
  - (4) regional economic development;
  - (5) long-, medium-, and short-term economic planning;
  - (6) manpower and employment;
  - (7) economic studies on education, health, and social development in general; and
  - (8) statistical programs and policy;
- (b) to undertake training programs designed to provide government and the nation as a whole with planners, analysts and economic statisticians, or in general, with technicians skilled and knowledgeable in the problems of economic development;
- (c) to serve as the medium for bringing together experts and specialists in other disciplines to conduct studies and investigations and engage in the interchange of ideas so as to bring their knowledge and experience to bear on common

problems with a view to evolving fresh ideas and approaches that could be effectively applied to economic development;

(d) to engage in the publication of the results of research.

# Part II. Program Accomplishments in 2010

### C. Research

In 2010, a total of 20 faculty and staff research grants were supported by PCED. Of these, six were newly granted in 2010 and 14 were completed in 2010. A complete list of PCED research contracts is provided in Table 1. The total outlay for these research grants amounted to P5.892 million.

PCED supports the publication of the *Philippine Review of Economics* (PRE), the principal professional economics journal of the Philippines. The PRE is jointly published by UPSE and the Philippine Economic Society twice a year and is circulated internationally. In 2010, one issue of the PRE was released.

Finally, the UPSE Discussion Paper Series, some of which have proven invaluable in important policy debates, are also funded by PCED. A total of 12 discussion papers were published in 2010 (Table 2).

In addition, PCED supported a number of UPSE public forums (in the form of rental fee waivers) in 2010, including the following:

O Book launch of *Diagnosing the Philippine Economy - Toward Inclusive Growth* on 22 January at the UPSE Auditorium. The book, published by the Asian Development Bank (ADB) and edited by Dante Canlas of the UP School of Economics and Muhammad Ehsan Khan and Juzhong Zuang of ADB,, provides an in-depth diagnostic study of various aspects of the Philippine economy and examines the critical constraints to growth and poverty

reduction in the medium term; it discusses policy options to help address these constraints.

- O Launch of the University-wide environment campaign, ICU or *Isko Cleans UP*, held on 09 February. This was followed by a talk of world-renowned environmental lawyer and Magsaysay Awardee, Atty. Antonio Oposa, at the UPSE parking lot and auditorium.
- Visit of the World Trade Organization (WTO) mission to the Philippines on 26-27 July.
   UPSE was included in the short-list bidding to host the Regional Training Program Course for the Asia-Pacific region.
- O Joint forum on *How Can Reforms Succeed?: Promoting Growth and Building Good Institutions*, organized with the Philippine Economic Society and held on 28 July at the UPSE Auditorium. Professors John V.C. Nye and Garett Jones of George Mason University presented their research on the topic.
- o Forum on the *Philippine Economic Outlook and Growth in Developing Asia*, co-organized with the ADB, held on 29 September at the UPSE Auditorium. The forum was an important part of the 2010-2011 *Asian Development Outlook*. Mr. Joseph Ernest Zveglich, Assistant Chief Economist, Mr. Norio Usui, Senior Country Economist, Philippine Country Office and Prof. Maria Socorro Bautista, Senior Economic Advisor, all of the ADB, served as panelists.

### F. Library acquisitions

The UPSE library houses one of the largest collections of economics books and journals in the country. In 2010, PCED supported library acquisitions including journal and newspaper subscriptions amounting to about P 0.7 million.

## G. Maintenance and upgrade of PCED property

An important component of PCED's support to UPSE comes in the form of property maintenance as the School is housed in the PCED building complex located at Guerrero St. in UP Diliman. The complex includes 11 classrooms, 30 faculty rooms, 5 meeting and seminar rooms, 7 school administration offices, a faculty lounge, a computer laboratory, a three-storey library building, and an auditorium.

### H. Personnel

### I. Fiscal Resources and General Allocation

The regular sources of funds for the PCED work plan are investment earnings and rental income. Investment earnings are generated from a P17 million Endowment Fund created by PD 453. Annually, the Board of Trustees reviews the financial performance of PCED and approves the proposed budget for the following year.

For fiscal year 2010, the Board approved a budget amounting to P 42,618,000. This was a significant departure from average annual budgetary amounts in the last 10 years, and can be explained by a P 29.75 million transfer from the National Government for infrastructure support (P 20 million) and research support (P 9.75 million).

Audited total expenditures for 2010 amounted to P 7,655,200. The P 29.75 million transfer from the National Government was re-programmed for use in 2011.

Total expenditures in 2010 can be broken down as follows: P 1.529 million for personnel services (PS), P 5.557 million for maintenance and other operating expenditures (MOOE), and P 0.5691 million for capital outlay (CO).

Table 7 shows the authorized and audited expenditures in 2010, broken down into PS, MOOE, and CO.

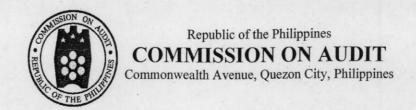

### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

#### The Board of Trustees

Philippine Center for Economic Development UP Diliman, Quezon City

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Philippine Center for Economic Development (PCED), which comprise the balance sheet as of December 31, 2010, and the statement of income, statement of changes in equity and cash flow statement for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory notes.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with State accounting principles, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with Philippine Standards on Auditing. Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

### 1. GENERAL INFORMATION

The Philippine Center for Economic Development (PCED) was created by virtue of Presidential Decree No. 453 on May 13, 1974. The function of the Center is to give financial and moral support to the research, teaching, training and other programs of the School of Economics of the University of the Philippines (UPSE). To provide a source for the funding of programs and projects of the Center, PD 453 established an Endowment Fund which shall be self-sustaining and shall consist of contributions, donations, bequests, grants and loans from domestic and/or foreign sources, government subsidy appropriations and other income accruing from the operations of the Center.

The Center holds office at the University of the Philippines – School of Economics, Diliman Campus, Quezon City, and has a manpower complement of four regular permanent employees.

### 2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

- 2.1 The statements of PCED have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles in the Philippines.
- 2.2 Financial assets earlier classified as investments are reclassified as Held-to-maturity investments. The Center's management has the intention and ability to hold to maturity its financial assets with determinable payments and fixed maturity. Those held-to-maturity investments with maturities of one (1) year or less from balance sheet date are included in the current assets, and those with maturities greater than 12 months after the balance sheet date are classified as non-current assets. These investments are recorded at premium or discount, which is amortized over the life of the bonds.
- 2.3 Allowance for doubtful accounts is maintained at a level adequate to provide for potential uncollectibility of receivables. A review of the receivables, designed to identify accounts to be provided with allowance, is made on a regular basis.
- 2.4 Inventories are valued at cost using the Moving Average Method.
- 2.5 Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE) is comprised mainly of office space and equipment and carried at cost less accumulated depreciation. Cost includes expenditures that are directly attributable to the acquisition of the items.

Depreciation on assets is calculated using the straight-line method to allocate the cost of the asset net of residual value of 10% of cost over its estimated useful life as prescribed by COA Circular 2003-007 which provides the policies and guidelines on the computation of depreciation of government property and on their useful lives ranging from five to ten years. Depreciation starts on the second month after purchase.

Major repairs/renovations are depreciated over the remaining useful life of the related asset while regular maintenance, repair and minor replacements are charged against Maintenance and Other Operating Expenses (MOOE) as these are incurred.

2.6 Payable accounts are recognized and recorded in the books of accounts only upon delivery of the goods/inventory/other assets and rendition of services to the agency.

### A. COMMENTS AND OBSERVATIONS

There were no significant findings noted in audit; hence, an unqualified audit opinion was issued on the fairness of presentation of the financial statements.

With regard to the Center's mandate to support the UP School of Economics (UPSE) through **teaching** (Bachelor's Degree and Graduate Program), **training** (for government officials completing the requirements in the Master in Development Economics), **research** projects of faculty members, and **public affairs and extension** (seminars and professional chair lectures), the following were accomplished in CY 2010 (with comparative figures for CY 2009):

Management attributed the non-attainment of 100 per cent of its target in the graduate program to the lack of interest on the part of the targeted participants in view of the inability to attend the programs on official time. In addition, the cycle in which the teaching program would be completed by the participants also poses a constraint since it covers a period of more than one year.

### Gender and Development

The Center appropriated P300,000 of its budget to support a research project on gender and macroeconomics as part of its Gender and Development (GAD) Plan for the year. However, despite compliance with the previous recommendation to coordinate with the School of Economics in disseminating information on the availability of funds for research proposals tackling on gender and economics, there were no research proposals submitted on the said subject. The Center, however, gave financial support to a Gender Sensitivity Training undertaken by the UPSE for which the Center spent P5,395. Likewise, it maintained its targeted gender ratio of at least 50:50 for its full-time staff

We, therefore, reiterated our recommendation that the Center coordinate with the National Council on the Role of Filipino Women (NCRFW) regarding activities that could be undertaken by the Center concerning GAD.

# B. STATUS OF IMPLEMENTATION OF PRIOR YEAR'S AUDIT RECOMMENDATIONS

Management was not able to implement our prior year's recommendation to coordinate with the National Council on the Role of Filipino Women (NCRFW) regarding activities that may be undertaken by the Center concerning GAD. Hence, our observation on said matter is reiterated in the current report.
